Statement of Board Responsibilities

Laois and Offaly Education and Training Board was established on 1 July 2013 under the provisions of the Education and Training Boards Act 2013.

The Board is responsible for keeping proper books of account which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Board and which enable it to ensure that the Financial Statements comply with section 51 of the Education and Training Boards Act 2013.

The Board is also responsible for safeguarding its assets and for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Statement on Internal Control

Responsibility for the System on Internal Control

As provided for under the Education and Training Boards Act 2013, Laois and Offaly ETB (LOETB) is responsible for reviewing and ensuring the effectiveness of the ETB's internal control.

A new board was constituted for LOETB on 27 August 2019 and at its meeting of 25 November 2019 the board completed the appointment of the new Finance and Audit and Risk Committees.

As Chairperson of LOETB, I acknowledge the responsibility of the Board for ensuring that an efficient, effective and economic system of internal control is maintained and operated. In 2019 LOETB operated under the Code of Governance for ETBs as adopted by LOETB on the 28 February 2019. The purpose of such a system is to ensure that assets are safeguarded, transactions are authorised and properly recorded, and that material errors or irregularities are either prevented or detected in a timely period. The Statement of Internal Control was reviewed and approved by the Board on 30 March 2020.

Purpose of the System of Internal Control

The system of internal control comprises of an entire system of controls, financial and otherwise, including risk management and corporate governance, which have been established by LOETB to:

- Ensure that LOETB meets its Statutory Functions under Section 10 of the 2013 Act;
- Ensure compliance with relevant legislation and funding obligations;
- Ensure that assets are safeguarded;
- Secure the integrity of transactions; and
- Secure as far as possible the accuracy and reliability of records.

The Board has taken steps to ensure an appropriate control environment by:

- Clearly defining management and staff responsibilities;
- Establishing procedures for identifying and evaluating all risks, which could prevent LOETB from achieving its objectives;
- Adopting a Risk Management policy at its meeting on 4 April 2016;
- Establishing procedures for reporting significant control failures and ensuring appropriate corrective action.

The system of internal control operated in LOETB is based on:

- Detailed administrative procedures;
- Segregation of duties;
- Specific authorisations;
- Internal check:
- Monthly management review of reports outlining the actual and budgeted results of programmes operated by LOETB
- Review of the systems of internal control carried out by LOETB's Compliance Officer

The Finance Committee support the Board in its responsibilities in relation to financial matters. The Finance Committee reviewed the 2019 Annual Financial Statements and recommended their adoption by the Board on 27 March 2020. The Finance Committee met 4 times in 2019. LOETB provided all information for each meeting as outlined in the Terms of Reference for the Finance Committee.

The Audit and Risk Committee supports the Board in its responsibilities for internal control comprising corporate governance risk management, internal audit and financial/non-financial controls and reviewing the assurances provided. The Audit and Risk Committee met 4 times in 2019. LOETB provided all information require for each meeting as outlined in the Terms of Reference for the Audit and Risk Committee.

LOETB has a Corporate Risk Management System in place across all its schools, FET and Head Offices. A Risk Management Team meets quarterly to review and update the Risk Register. The updated Risk Register is presented to the Audit and Risk Committee for approval and recommendation to the Board of LOETB and is formally adopted by the Board.

The Board's monitoring and review of the effectiveness of the system of internal control is informed by the:

- Work of the Audit and Risk Committee, which considers internal audit reports and reports of the Comptroller and Auditor General (C&AG), and reports to the board outlining whether or not the Chief Executive is, in the internal auditor's opinion, operating adequate and appropriate systems of internal control;
- Chief Executive, who has responsibility for the financial control framework;
- Recommendations made by the C&AG in management letters or other reports.

Ongoing Monitoring and Review

Formal procedures have been established for monitoring control processes and control deficiencies are communicated to those responsible for taking corrective action and to management and to the Board, where relevant. We confirm that the following ongoing monitoring systems are in place:

- Key risks and related controls have been identified and processes have been put in place to monitor the operation of those key controls and report any identified deficiencies.
- Reporting arrangements have been established at all levels where responsibility for financial management has been assigned
- There are regular reviews by senior management of periodic and annual performance and financial reports which indicate performance against budgets/forecasts.

The Board's monitoring and review of the effectiveness of the system of internal control is informed by the:

- Chief Executive, who has responsibility for the financial control framework.
- Recommendations made by the C&AG in management letters or other reports.

Annual Review of Controls

LOETB is committed to operating an efficient, effective and economic internal control system. I confirm that the Audit and Risk Committee at its meeting on 27 March 2020, conducted a review of the effectiveness of the system of internal control for year ended 31 December 2019 in the manner prescribed by the Code of Practice for the Governance of Education & Training Boards.

This included

- A review of internal and external audit reports issued in 2019 and to date in 2020 along
 with an examination of minutes of meetings of the Board, Audit and Risk Committee
 and Finance Committee to ensure there are no inconsistencies in these with the
 assessment of internal control provided to the Audit and Risk Committee in Internal
 Audit Reports and management representations.
- The Audit and Risk Committee also got confirmation from the Chief Executive that on balance the system of internal control is adequate and appropriate. The Chief Executive based this statement on information gathered from senior managers across the organisation.
- The Audit and Risk Committee presented a report on the review of controls to the Board on 30 March 2020.
- A Risk Register is kept up-to-date and presented to the Audit Committee on a regular basis.

The Board reviewed and approved this statement at its meeting held on 30 March 2020.

Public Procurement

LOETB is fully committed to complying with EU and national procurement regulations and guidelines. Notwithstanding this LOETB has not met all of its responsibilities in respect of procurement regulations. There are instances where goods and services have been procured locally in line with LOETB's procurement policy but the cumulative value across all sites may exceed the national tendering thresholds. However, LOETB developed a Corporate Procurement Plan (CPP) in 2019 and will continue to work so as to ensure that we are compliant.

Purchases for which no national tender was undertaken amounted to €575,727. The specific areas were Rental of Plant and Machinery €370,792, Stationery €56,954, Printed Matter including School Journals/Diaries € 125,966 and Signage €22,015.

Plant and Machinery:

- In 2019 LOETB incurred expenditure of €370,792 in relation to leasing of Plant and Machinery. The Contract was entered into in March 2017 and arose following a review and feasibility study of P & M. The review concluded that the P & M was out of date and not suitable for training and should be replaced. Given the pressing need to have the new P & M in place to meet the demand for training and new training commitments and the indicative timeline involved for a procurement of this nature, LOETB engaged Holden Plant Rentals to dispose of the old P&M and to supply new equipment on a lease basis. This was in line with the Section 6 (Exceptional Circumstances) of the LOETB Purchasing and Tendering Policy and Procedures.
- LOETB went to tender in early 2020 and a contract was awarded to the successful tenderer with effect from 1st September, 2020 to 31st August, 2022, with an option of two 12 month extensions thereafter.

Stationery:

• The OGP framework for stationery was in place but was due to expire on 4 June 2019. The OGP were working on a framework but due to challenges they were unable to put further arrangements in place at that time. Expenditure from the expiry of the framework to 31 December 2019 was €56,954. However, LOETB, during this period advised schools and centres to seek 3 quotations for stationery purchases. LOETB ran its own tender early in 2020 and a contract was awarded with effect from 1st June, 2020 to

31st May, 2021, with two 6 month extension options thereafter. LOETB is still awaiting on the OGP to tender for stationery.

Printed matter including School Journals/Diaries:

LOETB commenced a procurement process in December 2019 for printed matter and school journals/diaries. A contract for printed matter was awarded with effect from 1st March, 2020 to 28th February, 2021, with two one year extension options thereafter. However, the tender process for School/Journals and diaries was unsuccessful. LOETB are in the process of going to tender again for School Journals/Diaries.

Signage:

LOETB procured for Signage and the 3 suppliers are in place since October 2019.

Pension Statements

LOETB has a non-compliant level of approximately 80% in meeting its legal obligation of providing annualised benefit statements. LOETB is unable to provide these statements due to the constraints of the current IT systems, manual records, and staffing levels. A business case on an ETB-wide basis has been made to the Department of Education and Skills to seek additional staff for data capture. In addition, a case is also being made on an ETB-wide basis for a suitable IT System solution.

Protected Disclosures

LOETB received no protected disclosures in 2019 under the Protected Disclosures Act 2014.

Fraud Policy

No incidents were reported under the LOETB Fraud Policy in 2019.

Internal Audit

An Internal Audit function is provided by the Internal Audit Unit – Education and Training Boards.

The audit findings are based on the IAU-ETBs Terms of Reference and the internal audit unit provides an overall audit opinion on the area audited.

The overall opinion is based on the findings identified during the audit and the rate of possible opinions are as follows:

- Comprehensive system of internal control is adequate and operates effectively
- Adequate system of internal control is generally adequate and operates effectively
- Inadequate system of internal control is inadequate and does not operate effectively

A Specialist Training Providers (STPs) audit was carried out in November 2018 and the finalised report was received from IAU-ETBs in November 2019 and presented to the Audit and Risk Committee on 27 March 2020. The overall finding of the report was that there was an adequate system of controls in place. A total 11 recommendations were made of which, 3 are high, 5 are medium and 3 are low. LOETB has implemented all of the recommendations and are working, as recommended by IAU with the DES, SOLAS and other ETBs nationally in relation to the review the procurement process for the selection of STPs and ensure that

appropriately authorised contracts are in place between LOETB and STPs.

An ICT internal audit was completed in 2018. The IT Systems and Network Management controls covered by this audit are as follows:

- Business Continuity/ Disaster Recovery Planning
- Network Design
- Outsourced IT Services Disaster Recovery Arrangements
- IT System Backup and Restore
- Network Gateway Security Control

The overall Opinion finding of the audit report was that the controls in place were Inadequate. Management subsequently put a plan in place to address the findings and recommendations made in the report. There were a total of 31 recommendations, of which 10 are implemented, 12 partially implemented and ongoing, and 9 to be implemented.

Summary below of progress to date on a number of the recommendations at local level:

- Currently a working group is in place at ETBI level which includes OSD Directors, ETBI ICT Support Officer, OSD Support Services ETBI and ETB ICT Managers. ETBI has developed a Business Continuity Plan template and this is being piloted in one ETB before being rolled out to all ETB's
- LOETB has moved the Admin servers to Azure a cloud based systems and back-ups are occurring every 5 minutes.
- LOETB upgraded all computers in its Administrative offices in Tullamore and Portlaoise to Windows 10.
- New Server installed in Portlaoise.
- LOETB is ensuring that all future contracts/SLA's will include a provision for Disaster Recovery.
- Updating and reviewing ICT policies and procedures
- Reviewing and developing Policies and Procedures
- Completed an Asset Management Stocktake
- · Risk Assessments are in line with our Corporate Risk Assessment
- Aligned the ICT Data Protection Policy with GDPR

LOETB is continuing to work with the Department of Education and Skills to address the staffing and resource issues identified in the Audit Report and have been successful in receiving sanction for a Grade IV for our ICT Department which was filled on 2nd January, 2020.

Overdraft

LOETB's bank account went in to overdraft on the 31 December 2019. This was due to an error in calculating funds required over Christmas closure. This was a once-off occurrence. This did not affect any payments to staff or suppliers. Tighter controls have been implemented; monitoring spreadsheet to be completed and checked at the beginning of the month highlighting bank sweeping dates. Payment files section of IBB to be checked daily and signed off as checked.

Payroll Shared Services

The Education Shared Business Service (ESBS) has been established to deliver shared services in the Education sector. The migration of LOETB payroll for all staff took place in November 2019. The ESBS are responsible for the processing of the payroll while LOETB is still responsible for the issuing of instructions to shared services of the changes to payrolls and HR function.

The Chief Executive has confirmed that he has fulfilled his responsibilities in relation to the requirements of both the Memorandum of Understanding and also the Service Management Agreement that has been signed and is in place between LOETB and the Department of Education and Skills - Education Shared Business Service (ESBS) centre. These documents provide the framework for the operation of ESBS-ETB Payroll Shared Services on behalf of the ETB sector.

The Chief Executive relies on a letter of assurance from the Accounting Officer of the Department of Education and Skills that appropriate controls are exercised in the provision of payroll services by the ESBS to LOETB.

Opinion on the financial statements

I have audited the financial statements of Laois and Offaly Education and Training Board for the year ended 31 December 2019 as required under the provisions of the Education and Training Boards Act 2013. The financial statements comprise

In my opinion,

- the financial statements properly present the income and expenditure of the Board for 2019 and the state of affairs of the Board at 31 December 2019, and
- the financial statements are in accordance with the accounting policies laid down by the Minister for Education and Skills.

Basis of opinion

I conducted my audit of the financial statements in accordance with the International Standards on Auditing (ISAs) as promulgated by the International Organisation of Supreme Audit Institutions. My responsibilities under those standards are described in the appendix to this report. I am independent of Laois and Offaly Education and Training Board and have fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the standards.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

Report on information other than the financial statements, and on other matters

The Board has presented certain other information together with the financial statements. This comprises the statement of Board responsibilities, the statement on the system of internal control and a schedule of activities and pay costs. My responsibilities to report in relation to such information, and on certain other matters upon which I report by exception, are described in the appendix to this report.

Non-compliance with procurement rules

The statement on internal control discloses that in 2019 the Board incurred significant expenditure where the procedures followed did not comply with public procurement guidelines. The statement also sets out the steps taken or planned by the Board to address this matter.

My audit is conducted by reference to the special considerations which attach to State bodies in relation to their management and operation. I report if I identify material matters relating to the manner in which public business has been conducted.

I seek to obtain evidence about the regularity of financial transactions in the course of audit. I report if I identify any material instance where public money has not been applied for the purposes intended or where transactions did not conform to the authorities governing them.

I also report by exception if, in my opinion,

- I have not received all the information and explanations I required for my audit, or
- the accounting records were not sufficient to permit the financial statements to be readily and properly audited, or
- the financial statements are not in agreement with the accounting records.

2 Other Services

The Board also acts as an Agent and runs Self - financing Projects.

Agency work involves running a programme on behalf of another organisation or students, according to agreed criteria and the Board is reimbursed its cost.

Self - financing Projects are programmes run under the complete control of the Board either for the Board or other organisations.

The ETB does not make pension contributions in respect of employees.

Since 2013 all new entrants are obliged to join the single pension scheme.

From 1 January 2019 onwards, members of public service defined benefit pension schemes pay an additional superannuation contribution (ASC) arising from the Public Service Stability Agreement (2018- 2020) and the Public Service Pay and Pensions Act 2017. ASC has replaced the pension-related deduction (PRD) which ceased at the end of 2018. While PRD was a temporary emergency measure, ASC is a permanent contribution in respect of pensionable remuneration.

The amount collected in 2019 was €1,236,445, which were remitted to the Department of Education and Skills.

Financial Statements - Year Ended 31 December 2019

Establishment of the Education and Training Board and the Accounting Policies

1 Establishment of the Education and Training Board

Laois and Offaly Education and Training Board was established on 1 July 2013 and its functions are set out in section 10 of the Education and Training Boards Act 2013.

2 Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Basis of Presentation

The financial statements are presented in the form approved by the Minister for Education and Skills with the consent of the Minister for Finance and the Minister for Public Expenditure and Reform. They consist of a Statement of Accounting Policies, an Operating Statement, a Statement of Current Assets and Current Liabilities and notes to the financial statements.

Where necessary, the comparative figures for the previous year have been restated on the same bases as those for the current year,

(b) Basis of Preparation

The Operating Statement presents Receipts and Payments by Programme Grouping and the resultant Cash Surplus / (Deficit) is adjusted for other debtor and creditor movements to determine the overall result for the period on an accrual basis.

The Statement of Current Assets and Current Liabilities is prepared on the accruals basis by determining state grant and other funder balances at amounts that reflect the related expenditure incurred in accordance with the funding rules.

Third Party Debtors are included in Current Assets. Pay and Expense Liabilities are included in Current Liabilities.

(c) Tangible Fixed Assets

All assets purchased including land and buildings, fixtures and fittings and training equipment are expensed in the year of purchase. State grants to fund the purchase of tangible fixed assets are recognised in the same year.

(d) Stocks

All consumable stocks are expensed as purchased.

(e) Superannuation

The pension entitlements of ETB staff, including those who transferred from SOLAS, are conferred under defined benefit schemes. Staff employed since 2013 are included in the Single Public Service Pension Scheme and monthly payments are made to the Department of Public Expenditure and Reform.

Superannuation deductions made from employees' pay in respect of the schemes are retained by the ETB as part of agreed Exchequer funding, or paid over to the Department of Public Expenditure and Reform.

The ETB does not make any contributions towards the schemes.

These unfunded schemes are operated on a pay as you go basis with the annual pension entitlements being paid by the National Shared Services Office on behalf of the ETB, ETB's are responsible for the administration of their pensions. Pension funds are provided by the Department of Education and Skills.

Provision has not been made in the financial statements for the present cost of the future benefits that have accrued to staff members and existing pensioners under these schemes.

(f) Lease Rentals

All lease rentals are expensed as incurred.

Surplus receipts are due to the Department of £ducation and Skills and are not considered part of the current year funding.

Total grants are set by reference to anticipated expenditure in the case of Post-Primary Schools and Head Office Non-Pay programmes expenditure limits are set. Expenditure incurred in excess of this limit gives rise to a deficit, whereas savings can be relained and used to fund future deficits. LOETB had a Revenue Surplus of £58,952 for the year ended 31/12/2019 (Per Operating Statement page 8) and an Accumulated Revenue Surplus as at 31/12/2019 of £65.004 (Per Operating Statement page 8) and Statement of Current Assets and Current Liabilities page 9)

e Total State funding

The Reverue surplus of €58,952 includes an a Revenue Deficit on Self Financing programmes of €38,845. This is due to reduced receipts in 2019.

The difference between the total amount received from grantors of €56,050,122 above and the total in Note 9 - Funding of €57,468,188 is represented by Retained Superannuation Contributions of €1,416,086.

33 Events after the year end

Since the end of the reporting period, the economy and the ETB sector have been significantly affected by the COVID-19 pandemic However, LOETB continues to carry out it's vital role in education and training while being focused on ensuring continuity of education for learners, including a particular focus on more vulnerable students

The effects of the pandemic will have financial implications for LOETB in 2020 and beyond. The financial impacts of COVID-19 commenced in March 2020 and given the unprecedented uncertainty of the situation that LOETB finds itself in, a reliable estimate of the costs and savings arising from COVID-19 cannot not be made at this time. However, the main factors giving rise to additional costs and reduction in income are as follows.

- Additional unplanned expenditure on ICT equipment and software support to enable the continuation of learning for students and the safety of its employees by remote working.

 Additional costs to deliver training as it is expected that extra training allowances to participants in further education and training programmes will continue until courses are completed which may lead to some additional costs over the summer months.

 Anticipated reductions in income. LOETB anticipates a reduction in self-generated income as some programmes are on hold and the Outdoor Education Centres and crèches have temporarily closed. PLC fee income is also likely to be reduced as more participants become eligible for free fees.
- It is anticipated that the additional costs will be partially offset by savings in the areas of
- · substitution costs,
- consumables and costs incurred for contract management services and savings associated with the delivery of apprenticeships as most craft apprentices are released to their employers and there are no further intakes currently (It should be noted that this delay is likely however to lead to greater costs from 2021).
- LOETB has taken the following steps to manage the effects of the pandemic
- From the commencement of this crisis LOETB engaged its business continuity plan to ensure that its operations continued as normal in line with it regulatory requirements.

 The Audit and Risk Committee will review the updated LOETB's risk register to take account of the specific risks arising and LOETB will develop and ensure implementation of additional control measures as required.
- The Department of Education and Skills has put in place a range of steering and engagement structures to support the education and training system in navigating the challenges of COVID-19, LOETB is participating in these structures to ensure a joined-up approach across the education sector.

In the medium to long term, the ETB sector will have a significant role to play in the overall tertiary system response needed for labour market activation which will form part of a broader cross government and cross agency response. As a result, there will be a particular focus on effective management of resources and capacity.
