The Adult Educational Guidance and Information Service (AEGIS) provides a comprehensive, professional guidance and information service to the returning adult learner.

### **Activities during 2016:**

- Adult Guidance provision was provided to Adult Literacy, BTEI, VTOS, PLC, DSP referrals and the general
  public as follows: Intended progression of literacy students, CAO application, progression pathways, SUSI
  funding, Interview preparation, Study Skills, UCAS applications, interpretation of Dyslexia reports with
  students and ongoing support in-house in the Further Education & Training Centres in Laois and Offaly.
- Outreach Service to VTOS, Literacy and Community Groups e.g. the Partnerships and Job Clubs in Birr, Banagher, Rhode, Edenderry, Abbeyleix and Portarlington.
- Due to promotion of Mary Connell to Quality Officer the position of Information Officer became vacant in April 2016. In June 2016 it was agreed that Therese Glennon would provide 11 hours information provision for AEGIS. In order to maximise the impact of this aspect of provision, an Adult Guidance LOETB Facebook was established and an access email of guidanceinfo@loetb. ie was set up which enabled all registered learners to avail of support on a needs basis. Therese also researched, collated information and gave presentations on Study Skills, SUSI, BTEA and the CAO application process. A new information leaflet was devised to promote the service to a wider target audience e.g. job clubs, community groups and the public in general.
- New Start, is a joint initiative between DSP and LOETB which focusses on career, interests, skills and talents. The Adult Guidance Service played a key role in the development and the coordination of the programme, ensuring that DSP referrals were appropriately placed on subsequent education programmes.





- Provision of ongoing support to Coordinators and Teachers/Tutors regarding personal and progression issues with students.
- Advice and support to Further Education team regarding entry requirements enabling successful FET to HE student progression.
- Linked with HSE Community Mental Health Services and professional psychological services for example Jigsaw Tullamore operating a two way referral process, Beech Haven Centre in St. Fintans Hospital Portlaoise, and Occupational
- Therapists with HSE. AEGI staff have identified increased referrals from and links with Midland Simon and Peter McVerry Trust.
- Catherine Gavigan in Offaly is on the steering group of the MOJO Offaly programme (an interagency
  programme funded by the National Office for Suicide Prevention (NOSP), and supported by local agencies to
  provide a coordinated response to men who are in 'distress' or those who are affected by unemployment.).
   Geraldine Grennan is on the MOJO practice group. The Guidance Service facilitated group sessions with
  MOJO Offaly participants regarding our service, educational progression opportunities and learning styles.
- In Nov 2016 Carmel Hoolan began a series of meeting with Employment Service Case
   Officers in Laois which culminated with the establishment of the Area Liaison Group (ALG)
   between the ETB and DSP, which has resulted in more referrals to Guidance in Laois.
- The existence of the protocol between the DSP/ Employment Services and LOETB ensures ongoing
  referrals to the Adult Guidance Service with measured increase.
   Advertisement and promotion of the Adult Guidance Service through course brochures, the
  LOETB website, Facebook page and presentations in local job clubs and community groups.
- Links were maintained with Athlone IT and Maynooth University students from Tullamore FET Centre were taken to college open days. They met with the access officer and student support services where a special programme was provided tailored to their progression pathways encouraging them to explore the educational options. Students also engaged with former students of our programmes in the Further Education centre who had progressed to third level. Links maintained with Carlow IT, LIT and GMIT students availing of advanced entry to these colleges from Business and Art courses in Abbeyleix.
- AEGI organised a CV, interview skills, and job searching workshop with Sinead English for all Work Experience tutors.
- LOETB Adult Guidance Services facilitated a workshop on SUSI at the annual Careers fair in Edenderry, presented by Catherine Gavigan and Therese Glennon.

- Speakers from Athlone IT and DIT visited learners at the Tullamore FET Centre. Speakers from Carlow College, Carlow IT and Maynooth University visited Abbeyleix and Portarlington Centres.
- LOETB AEGIS invited former students of VTOS, BTEI and PLC programmes throughout
  the year in Tullamore and Portlaoise Further Education and Training Centres who have
  progressed to education and employment to speak with and motivate our students.
- The Guidance Team meet on a quarterly basis to evaluate emerging needs and issues of learners and to support the development of provision between services. One initiative was to set up a shared drive to upload up to date information and resources for guidance staff in LOETB.

### **Programmes and Initiatives:**

The literacy service in Laois worked with the Home School Community Liaison Officer in Scoil Bhríde, Knockmay on a new intensive **Family learning Project** involving Art and Creative Writing. Parents wrote books for their children and created the art pieces to go with them. The programme, although in its infancy, has the potential to attract more parents to Family learning programmes in the future and have a dedicated team of Adult Education tutors in the primary school.

The literacy services are using **BKSB** to assess learners for programmes 3-4. This programme has proven very beneficial but we are still using our own literacy assessment for literacy learners. The services in Laois and Offaly ran an **Initial Tutor Training** course over five Saturdays in March and April and 18 people completed it. Of these 10 people are now working on a voluntary basis with the services in both counties.

From September we increased **ESOL** language provision in both counties with students attending more intensive programmes where possible. Additional hours were allocated to part-time ESOL coordination which has proven very effective.

In response to need of young unemployed men, the literacy service in partnership with DSP, recruited and assessed young men in November for an **Electrical Skills Level 3** course. The men were brought back to the service in December for an introductory session and information before starting in January 2017...

### Other Events/Training:

- Awards ceremonies were held in Laois and Offaly literacy services during
   Adult Learners Festival Week in February and also in December.
- The Dyslexia Association provided an excellent in-service in both Laois and Offaly literacy services
  on how to structure classes to support students with dyslexia. (October and November 2016).
- Anthony O'Prey hosted a Managing Stress Workshop for tutors (October 2016).
- Two parents on Family Learning Courses gave a talk at the International Literacy Day in Dublin City Council Civic Offices organised by NALA. They spoke about their experience on a Family Learning Storytelling course and how it has increased their confidence.







 Literacy Awareness Training was provided to Turas Nua staff in Laois and Offaly (August and November 2016).

1916 Centenary Celebrations were held in Tullamore in March 2016 – students and tutors read the Proclamation, held a debate, recited poetry, sang songs, played music, danced, and displayed art work.

ITABE programmes in Offaly joined together to organise a Project Trip to the 1916 Centenary Exhibition Centre in the GPO, Dublin.

During Anti-Racism Week in March the centre in Laois had a Festival of Languages with displays from many countries, the festival also included exhibitions from the Travelling Community on their language. Two of Syrian students in the centre also held presentations each day on life in Syria before the war. The whole week was open to the general public to attend and was a great success.

The centre in Portlaoise provided a three week intensive English School during June. The focus was on integration particularly the integration of students from the Syrian Refugee Resettlement Programme.

Banagher Further Education and Training Centre offers a range of options for early school leavers at QQI Levels 3 & 4 on the NFQ. The programme aims to develop the core skills needed for learning and to prepare the students to progress to further education, training and employment.

### Students:

The Youthreach programme has an allocation of 20 places. The throughput figure for 2016 was 27 students. Of this overall figure, 18 were male and 9 were females.

The Youthreach programme places a strong emphasis on the core skills of Maths, Communications, Information Technology, SPHE, Work Experience, and also on the personal development of all our students. Vocational options such as Catering, Computers, Sports, Hairdressing and Woodwork are all available on our curriculum. In 2016 we also added Metalwork and Construction Studies to the curriculum.

### **Programmes & Initiatives:**

Non-Certified Courses delivered at the Centre included:

#### Safe Food Programme

Students took part in the Safe Food Programme with Tess Egan. The programme consisted of three modules where students learned about Healthy eating, Food Safety, Physical Activity and Energy Balance. Students participated in games, activities, discussions and completed worksheets in all three modules. They received certificates on successful completion of the programme.

### • Mount Lucas Pilot Construction Programme

Our students were provided with the opportunity to take part in a summer provision programme in Construction Studies. Students completed their Safe Pass training as part of this 7-week taster course at the National Construction Training Centre, Mount Lucas, Daingean, Co. Offaly.

### • Healthy Food Made Easy Programme

This programme was provided by Laois Partnership Company in collaboration with the Health Service Executive and was delivered over a 6-week period. The aim of the course was to encourage healthy eating, improve knowledge of nutrition especially when preparing food at home and learn how to make healthy meals on a budget. Students had the opportunity to prepare, cook and eat healthy meals each week. They completed an accompanying workbook and received a certificate at the end of the program.

## NFTE (Network for Teaching Entrepreneurship) Programme

This youth education and development programme was provided by Foróige as part of their Youth



Entrepreneurship Programme. Students worked with Claire Grehan, Enterprise Youth Worker and studied all aspects of starting and successfully running a business. They came up with a business idea, developed and designed their products and produced a business plan. Students produced Christmas logs, baby hampers, keyrings and bracelets to sell at various Craft Fairs for the Christmas market. Students were presented with their certificates having successfully completed the programme.

#### • SUB Justice Project Birr

The youth workers from the SUB Project came to the centre to deliver their 'Fred Goes Net' programme which aims to tackle the issue of alcohol and drug use in the hope that our students will make good decisions in relation to both substances. The youth workers also ran another programme called 'Boys World' which aimed to tackle the issues facing young men in today's world.

### • Fast Track Into Information Technology

This organisation ran a programme which aimed to get our students ready for employment. This programme included designing Curriculum Vitae, formal mock

interviews, and a visit to a local business.

### • Taster Engineering Course:

Our students were provided with the opportunity of participating in an Engineering Taster Course which ran over a 12 week period.

### Offaly Local Development Company (OLDC):

OLDC staff came in to the centre to deliver their Goals Programme which aimed to raise self-esteem and independence in our students and assist them in identifying their goals in life and how to achieve these.

Our students also had the opportunity to work with Birdwatch Ireland on their Swift Swallow project. We also attended the 2016 Centenary Programme School Flag Presentation in Croke Park with some of our students. The students also had an Internet Safety Day. We also invited Youth Connect in to speak with our students about 'The Working World'.

We had Laois Sexual Health Clinic attend the centre to speak to our students on their sexual health and best practice. We attended a Teen Dating Seminar in Tullamore hosted by Offaly Domestic Violence Group. We invited the Marie Keating

Foundation to our centre to speak to our students about Cancer Awareness.

We also invited back one of our former students Oliver Carroll to speak to our students about his journey from Youthreach to a PLC in Applied Science onto his Science Degree in Athlone Institute of Technology.

In 2016, we hosted our annual Intergenerational Project with Banagher Active Age group as part of our QQI Level 4 project in Food and Nutrition.

Portlaoise Youth Education Centre offers a range of options for early school leavers at QQI Levels 3 & 4 on the NFQ. The programme aims to develop the core skills needed for learning and to prepare the students to progress to further education, training and employment. The centre also offers a BTEI Level 2 in Communications and Maths operating three afternoons a week for early school leavers.



LOETB assumed responsibility for provision of training, and the management of Apprenticeships, in Laois and Offaly on March 1st 2016. Training is a key element in LOETB's capacity to engage learners, communities, and employers in a broad range of Further Education and Training (FET) programmes and projects across Laois and Offaly.

Training adopts a partnership approach that identifies the needs of employers and industry, of local communities and, most crucially, of learners - and plans flexible, accessible and strategic responses that facilitate and support clear learner access, transfer and progression, ultimately into employment.

LOETB delivers training through its five distinct, but inter-connected areas of responsibility;

Training Provision under Contract Training is shaped by the labour market landscape within both counties, the specific needs of people who are unemployed, under employed or those in employment who require new or enhanced skills.

The following programmes under Contract Training have been developed during 2016:

- In response to national industry needs; in construction four programmes initiated in 2016, with 68 learners engaged, as a direct response to the national skills shortage in form workers. A comprehensive review of this pilot programme has been completed – leading to separation of provision in 2017; General Operative and Formwork with LOETB assuming responsibility for employer engagement and work placement programme.
- In response to local DSP client needs; Traineeships in both Healthcare Support and Beauty
  Therapy were developed but core traditional content was altered significantly, following
  consultation with local employers, to enhance learner employability options.
- In response to Turas Nua client needs; 2 short retail programmes were developed that integrated Medical Counter Assistant module certified by the Irish Pharmaceutical Union.
- To introduce early school leavers to a vocational career pathway; introduction to Construction Programme developed for Youthreach/Community Training Centre learners to explore of pathways to work.

In short, LOETB has developed, during 2016, a contract training programme in construction that SOLAS have elevated to national programme status, changed the content of the Beauty Traineeship and Healthcare Support programmes to reflect the changing needs of the market and of the learner – the changes in Beauty Therapy have since been adopted by some Training Centres and by ITEC. Healthcare Support provision, given its liberal usage at Level V, is now focusing providing graduates of that programme with the additional skills and training required by regulatory bodies. Changes made to inherited Welding provision directly resulted in 83% progression to employment on the day the programme finished and all participants receiving a merit in our first utilisation of the City and Guilds Welding Fabrication Module.

We inherited 155 apprentices in March 2016. This increased to 268 in the first year, an increase of 72%.

We have approximately 150 employers with current apprentices. Individual employers with most apprentices are Bord na Móna (25 apprentices), Romaquip (14 apprentices) and John Fletchers in Portarlington (9 apprentices). However, most employers employ one apprenticeship in Laois and Offaly, illustrating the nature of the labour market landscape in the region. All of the above Apprentices are participating in the traditional Craft Apprenticeship Programme.

LOETB has embraced the development of new industry-led apprenticeships. We have one apprentice completing the BA Hons Degree in business and insurance at Campion Insurance in Portlaoise. Bord na Móna are registered for the Level 7 Industrial Electrical Engineer Apprenticeship.

LOETB has significantly enhanced the level of engagement with existing employers, new apprentices and newly registered employers. There has been a keen focus on taking both employers and apprentices through our registration process, engaging with their employers and setting standards required under the National Programme and LOETB. The input of colleagues in Further Education has enabled successful supports being provided for apprentices who find the academic element of the apprenticeship challenging. The Maths for Trades has been particularly important with 10 apprentices attending and a further 10 on a waiting list for September 2017.

- LOETB undertook a skills needs analysis with Bord na Móna that identified IT training needs for current employees.
- Developed non-accredited programmes based on employer and employee consultation.
- Training programmes are currently being delivered at three Bord na Móna sites at time and dates the employer and employees.

#### **Community Training Centre**

LOETB works in partnership with Tullamore Community Training Centre (CTC) to provide community based training for early school leavers as part of the national Youthreach programme. Community Training Centres are independent, community-based organisations which provide training and related supports for early school leavers primarily aged between 16 – 21 years who have left school with no formal or incomplete qualifications. Programmes at the centre are being enhanced to promote greater focus on skills development that are likely to match accessible employment opportunities and LOETB is exploring, with the Board of Management at Tullamore CTC, the enhancement of facilities that will enable evening provision at the centre.

#### Local Training Initiative (LTI)

An LTI programme is a community-based training programme targeted at 16-25 year olds who are economically, socially, geographically or educationally disadvantaged. The overall aim of the LTI programme is to assist unemployed people, not otherwise catered for through other LOETB interventions, to move towards employment by providing community-based training and work experience leading to nationally recognised qualifications. Offaly Local Development Company is contracted (as Second Providers) to deliver the LTI Programmes in Birr, Banagher and Edenderry and LOETB has worked with Laois Partnership Company to develop two new LTIs in Laois during 2016 - Catering Support in Mountmellick and Employment Skills (Repairs and Maintenance) in Mountrath.

#### Specialist Training Programme (STP)

LOETB contracts the National Learning Network to deliver training programmes for people with disabilities. These programmes offer more intensive support than is available in non-specialist training provision.

Operating out of its Training Centres in Portlaoise and Tullamore the NLN provides a range of specialist courses available at two levels of training; Introductory Skills Training (IST) and Skill Specific Training (SST). The specialist training provision includes in-centre; employer based and blended learning approaches to accommodate learners' training needs.

Across all three programmes under Community Training LOETB has been working with providers to ensure that each programme is engaging the most appropriate learners.

The Centre at Mount Lucas was built by FÁS in 2008. In January 2016, LOETB assumed responsibility for the centre with the dual goal of developing construction skills for youth and unemployed in Laois, Offaly and the surrounding counties, and developing experienced workers' skillsets to meet changing industry needs.

The Centre's remit covers non-craft worker training and certification of New Entrants and Experienced Workers in the National Construction Skills Certificate (CSCS). It also offers the Construction Skills for Employment (Formwork) Programme tailored to industry needs. In addition, Mount Lucas administers the CITB UK changeover programme for Irish CSCS cardholders who wish to attain recognition to allow them to work in the UK by completing the UK Health Safety & Environmental (HSE) Test, the compulsory pre-clearance test that enables entry to work on UK sites.

Just under 400 trainees progressed through Mount Lucas in 2015 while 2016 saw a total of 684 trainees at the centre

Centre facilities have been refurbished, with equipment and formwork materials purchased to ensure that the centre is the leader in this area.

The entire fleet of plant and machinery, including a unique Crane, has been upgraded enabling Mount Lucas to offer training on the precise machinery that the trainee can expect to encounter on the construction site. The training at Mount Lucas is provided in a simulated work environment. There are now over 15 acres assigned for machinery training, we also have a 700m2

Construction Hall that is used for small machine training and is currently in use as a workshop for the Form Work programme. All areas at the Centre are set out so participants are trained in Construction skills in real work environments.

The development of a Strategic Plan for Mount Lucas is ongoing with key stakeholders representing funders, providers and industry now engaged. The plan will be published during 2017.

#### Students:

In April 2016, following the transfer of training services from Longford and Westmeath ETB to LOETB, a Quality Assurance Department was established. The Department consists of a Quality Assurance Manager, Quality Assurance Officer and Administrator and is based at the Administrative Offices, Ridge Road, Portlaoise, Co. Laois.

Functions of the QA Department include:

- Maintaining the current quality assurance system operated by the further education centres with Quality and Qualifications Ireland (QQI) and the Transition Quality
   Assurance System (TQAS) operated by the Training Services with QQI.
- Coordinating the certification processes in all centres for all accredited FET programmes.
- Administration of central Assessment System used for training programmes.
- Coordination and the administration of the Programme Learner Support System (PLSS) a comprehensive
  database used by all ETBs introduced by Solas which contain a full inventory of FET programmes, a calendar
  of when and where the programmes are running, and a learner referral system that is linked with the
  Department of Social Protection. In 2017, the functionality of the system will include the introduction of
  a learner database which tracks the learner journey from the point of referral to course completion.
- Administration and centre support in the assessment of all applicants for FET programmes in order to determine learners are on courses at correct levels.
- Collection and collation of statistics relating to FET programmes.

## Youth Work Services

LOETB acknowledges valuable role that youth work plays in the lives of young people and the important contribution it makes to the communities throughout Laois and Offaly. We recognise that youth work and those involved in delivering it at the local level contribute to the strengthening of those communities.

In order to ensure the highest and most comprehensive quality of service is delivered to young people in Laois and Offaly, the Youth Officer ensures that there is:

- Co-ordination of plans, proposals and activities regarding youth work Provision of financial assistance.
- Preparation a Youth Work Development Plan.
- Compilation of a Youth Work Annual Report.
- Designation, review or withdrawal of designation for local youth work/service organisations.
- Establishment of a Youth Work Committee to advise and make recommendations on the performance of its
  youth work functions.

#### Youth Capital Funding Scheme 2016 and 2017:

The aim of this capital funding scheme was provide much needed assistance to youth projects and was split into two categories:

- Type One, which provides for the up-grade or replacement of equipment or the purchase of essential equipment to support the running of the project or organisation.
- Type Two, which will fund health and safety improvements to premises or the upgrade or refurbishment
  of premises, including the purchase and installation of kitchen and toilet facilities or improvements to
  enable access to young people with disabilities, including those with physical or sensory disabilities.

- **1. Project Boundaries:** This is to map out the small areas that a project covers or its catchment area.
- **2. Dot Location:** This is where the building where the project is based. When the dot is click on the map, a dialogue box will appear with details of the project name, information and contact details for the project.

#### Local Youth Club Grant Scheme:

The Local Youth Club Grant Scheme (LYCGS) supports voluntary youth club activities at local level. The Scheme, which provides grant-aid towards the costs of running clubs, is part-funded by the proceeds of the National Lottery. Funding for the Scheme is provided by the Department of Children and Youth Affairs (DCYA) and administered locally by Education & Training Boards on the Department's behalf.

The Scheme supports voluntary youth club activities for young people; with priority being given to young people between the ages of 10 and 21. The primary focus of this Scheme is to assist local voluntary youth clubs who offer a youth work response to young people. In addition, other clubs/groups that work with young people who are not specifically youth work are also entitled to apply for funding under this scheme.

## **Corporate Governance**

#### Code of Practice for the Governance of Education and Training Boards

A Code of Practice for the Governance of LOETB was adopted in May 2015. The Code adopted is consistent with the Guidelines set out by the Department of Education and Skills in Circular Letter 18/2015. The purpose of the Code is to ensure that the principles of Good Governance and Management are applied by LOETB.

Corporate governance comprises of the systems and procedures by which entities are directed and controlled. State bodies, including ETBs, must serve the interests of the taxpayer, pursue value for money in their endeavours (including managing risk appropriately), and act transparently as public entities. The Board (i.e. the entity comprising elected and appointed members of LOETB) is responsible and accountable for the proper direction and control of LOETB. In order to deliver good governance in LOETB, the Board must act in the interest of LOETB at all times, consistently with the requirements of legislation and government policies, avoiding self-interest and the interests of third parties, including bodies which have elected or nominated them.

#### Ethics in Public Office Act, 1995 and the Standards in Public Office Act 2001

All Staff Members occupying designated positions of employment and Board Members occupying designated directorships in LOETB complied with the requirements of the Ethics in Public Office Act, 1995 and the Standards in Public Office Act 2001 for the period 1st January 2016 to the 31st December 2016. Each person confirmed to LOETB that they have been advised of and understand their obligations under the terms of the Ethics in Public Office Act, 1995 and the Standards in Public Office Act 2001.

#### LOETB Board Meetings

In accordance with Schedule 3, paragraph 2 (2) of the Education and Training Boards Act, 2013, LOETB held 8 meetings in 2016. A register of attendance was maintained. Minutes of each meeting were adopted and signed by the Chairperson. A record of Members' attendance at the Board Meetings and details of their expenses are recorded on page 76 of this report.

#### **LOETB's Finance Committee**

LOETB established a Finance Committee on 25 May 2015, in accordance with Section 45 of the Education and Training Boards Act 2013.

The Finance Committee reports to the Board, not less than four times in each year on whether the Chief Executive is implementing the Service Plan, as adopted by the Board, and within the expenditure limits set by the Minister. This is achieved by considering the monthly accounts and ad hoc reports provided to the Board by the Chief Executive.



# Financial Report

#### **Finance Strategy**

The objective of the Finance function is to support the Board in the achievement, within budget, of objectives set out in the Letter of Determination from the Department of Education and Skills (DES), the allocation letter from SOLAS and other sources. Finance support includes decision making support, corporate control of public money, transaction processing, and statutory accountability.

#### **Statutory Accountability**

Strict accountability requirements apply to LOETB. These requirements include the preparation of annual accounts in a format prescribed by the Dept. of Education and Skills (DES) and the audit of these accounts by the Comptroller and Auditor General (C&AG). LOETB is also subject to audit by the Internal Audit Unit (IAU–ETB). Financial control systems are in place to ensure compliance with these requirements and to ensure the effective achievement of objectives. LOETB complies with its obligations under taxation laws and ensures that all tax liabilities are paid on or before the relevant due dates, as set out under Section 27 of the Code of Practice for the Governance of LOETB.

#### Comments on Performance - Achievements/Developments:

- Pay costs under Schools & Head Office, Associated Main Scheme and Further
   Education and Training take into account reduced pay rates and delayed increments.
- The cost of creditor invoices (including capital projects) was €13,009,521.
   The cost of late payments amounted to €4,087, or 0.03%.
- 3. Capital projects accounted for expenditure of €5,287,115 in the period January 2016 to December 2016.
- Third Level Grant costs are continuing to decrease due to the transfer of the administration of third level and PLC grants to SUSI.
- The costs of Youth Services in the period January 2016 to December 2016 amounted to €107,359. Local Youth Club grants accounted for €41,878 of this amount.
- Agency/Self-Financing Projects are programmes where money is received from sources other than the DES/SOLAS. They include Birr Outdoor Education Centre and school/centre bank accounts.
- LOETB, at the 31 December 2016, had an overall deficit of €85,057. The deficit balance occurred on Schools & Head Office Non-Pay.
- Ongoing enhancements to the ESI Manser computer software package were undertaken during the period 1 January 2016 to 31 December 2016.
- LOETB will implement the accrual accounting system (income/ expenditure and balance sheet) when and as required by DES.

#### Reduction in Payment Periods for Commercial Transactions:

Following on from Government Decision S 29296 of 19th May 2009 to reduce the payment period to 15 days for commercial suppliers, the Government decided to extend the 15 day prompt payment rule, currently applying to central Government Departments, to other Public Sector Bodies including Bodies under the Aegis of the DES. This reduced payment period came into effect from 1st July 2011. See below quarterly returns for January 2016 to December 2016.






# **ENERGY CONSUMPTION (TPER) - 2015**




TRANSPORT — THERMAL ELECTRICITY










# CO<sub>2</sub> EMISSIONS - 2015

2015 CO<sub>2</sub> EMISSIONS = **1,427,273868 kgCO**<sub>2</sub>


# CO<sub>2</sub> Emissions Since Baseline (TPER)

Each appointment to LOETB is subject to receipt of a satisfactory disclosure from the National Vetting Bureau, with effect from the 29 April 2016 and a pre-employment medical questionnaire (PEMQ1) which is conducted by Medmark Occupational Health. Between 1st January 2016 and 31st December 2016 a total of 129 appointments were made.
